Jam tunes for you by Linda Sandersen

When you go to a bluegrass jam, it is important to have your instrument tuned before you arrive. It may need a little tweaking when you take it out of the case in winter weather, as it's really cold outside and is much warmer indoors. It's a major shock to the strings!

If you can't keep up with the strumming tempo, you should sit on the sidelines until you are up to speed. A jam is a great place to learn by watching and listening. Be sure to bring along a capo for your guitar or banjo, as keys that are often used need a capo. I don't play in B or Bb without a capo as those chords are difficult to play on their own and don't sound very good in the bluegrass genre. They may work well in folk music, but that's not what we're doing here.

By playing out of a G or C chord pattern you can get a lot of good bass runs that are fun to play. Those keep the music moving and are exciting on their own. The majority of songs that you'll hear at a jam only use 3 chords, I, IV, V, always annotated in Roman numerals. Some minor chords are added from time to time, depending on the song. Put a song in your own best singing key.

Here is a good one to learn:

- Keep on the Sunny Side D or A A.P Carter
 - I IV I I.There's a dark and a troubled side of life.
- There's a bright and a sunny side, too.
- Tho' we meet with the darkness and strife,
- The sunny side we also may view.

Get to know your BBMA member band Sawdust Symphony

Sawdust Symphony has the double distinction of being not only the busiest but also the longest-running bluegrass band in Southeast Wisconsin.

The band played 121 dates In 2023 alone. Mike Mueller, the band leader and banjo player, has a goal of slowing down a bit this year. In 2024, he wants to keep it to 100.

The band was founded in 1999 with Mike on banjo; Al Brundage, who played with the group for 14 years, on mandolin; Al's son, Greg, who came up with the band name, on guitar; and Kurt Lang on bass. John Lozienecki succeeded Kurt in the bass spot and remained with the group for 13 years.

Sawdust Symphony's story would not be complete without some of the personal story of Mike Mueller, who has been the band's driving force for the past 25 years. Mike's love for the banjo began when he was a student at Nicolet High School and saw the movie Deliverance, with its famous "Duelin' Banjos" scene, for the first time. Following two weeks of harassment, his mother agreed to buy him a banjo and pay for a few lessons.

The next several years would find Mike often practicing his banjo anywhere from four to eight hours a day, a regimen he has since relaxed only slightly. While he was studying at UW-Stevens Point, a neighbor heard him picking outside one day and came over to ask if he knew how to play Cripple Creek. Mueller and that neighbor, Don Bren, quickly became friends and, with Bren both singing and playing guitar, were off to making music together.

Two weeks later, Don had them trying out for Ed McMahon's Star Search. They passed the audition and were invited to a regional contest in South Dakota, which they ultimately could not attend because of the time commitment and travel expenses.

After graduating from UW-Stevens Point with degrees in both business and history, Mike returned to Milwaukee and began working in his family's foodservice business. Following its sale to Kraft Foods in 1989. Mike was hired on as a sales representative. He remains employed at Kraft to this day.

Mike was bitten by the banjo bug again in 1999. Sawdust Symphony saw its first gig at what is now The Brick in Glendale.

The band's current lineup also includes Greg Brundage on guitar, Mark Vitkus on mandolin and Max Winkel on bass.

John Steinman, a veteran Bluegrass player who recently moved here from North Carolina, will sit in for select gigs.

All the members sing and share a common desire to make Bluegrass Music as often as possible. Sawdust Symphony has released three CDs and is in the midst of recording a fourth, which will have a couple of original tunes from Greg. The band has had a spot at many a prominent festival, including Badgerland Bluegrass Music Association's The Big Thaw, Flatrock, Ladies of Bluegrass and the East Troy Bluegrass Festival.

Mike is the proud owner of two 1929 Gibson Granada banjos. His favorite was acquired from a collector in New York who had lent it to J.D. Crowe. Crowe had it for three years and is on record as calling it, "The best banjo I ever played." (It's practically a consensus among people who've been lucky to have it in their hands.)

Sawdust Symphony plays a great number of traditional bluegrass tunes but also includes plenty of classic country and rock tunes by bands like The Beatles, The Grateful Dead and The Rolling Stones.

You can of course see and hear them on Spotify and Facebook. But the best way to enjoy this splendid bluegrass band is to catch them at a live performance. The good news is that's not difficult.

As mentioned at the beginning, they're planning to play more than one hundred shows this year alone.
